Celebrating 30 Years of Support!


nce upon a time, 30 years ago, Deer Hollow Farm was at risk of becoming history rather than preserving it. But thankfully a wonderful group of individuals banded together and formed Friends of Deer Hollow Farm (FODHF), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization to raise funds to help save the farm. "It was one of the best experiences of my life. There were no egos involved, everyone was in it to save the farm," said Donna Poulos, a founding board member of FODHF along with Joy Desai, Jane Griffith, Jerry Juracich and Mary (Mimi) Mourkas. Today, Deer Hollow Farm is a vibrant environmental educational center with ~130,000 visitors per year from across the Bay Area.

Education

Deer Hollow Farm is an educational center where the public, school classes and community groups can observe and participate in an historic working farm. The hope is that by connecting people with the natural world and helping them understand our interdependence, people's lives are enriched and in turn, they want to protect and preserve the land. About 5,000 pre-K thru 4th grade students from 40-45 Bay Area schools take a variety of experiential educational classes each year, with FODHF providing scholarships for approximately 50%. Topics include Life Science, Ohlone Habitat, Farm & Garden, Sheep & Goats, and Fleece & Milk. In addition to the field trip classes, seven weeks of summer camps are offered for 6-14 years old as well as a very popular Summer Camp Internship for high school-aged volunteers. Visitors are welcome to take a self-guided tour and learn about the history of the Farm at no charge. The friendly farm animals, garden and orchard are available for viewing during regular Farm hours.

History and Community

Deer Hollow Farm is one of the last working homestead farms in California and has a rich history. The Grant Brothers settled what is now Deer Hollow Farm and about 360 surrounding acres in 1853. They ran businesses on their land: ranching, dairy farming, and grain growing, and as such, were wealthier than the average 19th century American homesteader. They could afford to hire a foreman, who lived in the Foreman's cabin, the oldest structure at Deer Hollow Farm. The Grant Family sold the property to George Perham in 1937, who ran a construction company on the land. The property was acquired by Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District (MROSD) in 1975. However, it was not part of MROSD mission to run an educational facility, but they were willing to make the farm available to any agency willing to do so. Thankfully, Glenn Lyles, Recreation Supervisor for the City

of Mountain View at the time, had an appreciation for farms and vision to leverage the 1973 Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) to fund a naturalist, Linda Newberry, and Michael Groethe for farm maintenance. They scraped together funds and accepted donations for tools, animals and food/care for the same. Glenn and Linda also named the farm. They were sitting in the Ohlone Village (Quail Garden at the time) and decided yes it was a hollow, so toyed with the idea of Quail Hollow Farm, but just then a deer walked by and they liked the sound of Deer Hollow Farm, and so it was decided. A budget crisis in 1978 put the farm at risk, but donations came in and community members voiced support at council meetings. MROSD assumed the maintenance costs and funding for a maintenance position, which continues today. Funding was a concern again in 1994 and FODHF was formed to raise funds to help offset the City of Mountain View's costs. And this proved invaluable in 2010, when once again the City's budget challenges put farm funding at risk, so FODHF alleviated the shortfall.

Looking to the Future

For the past 30 years, the strong partnership between the City of Mountain View Parks & Recreation Department, who in turn receives funding from Santa Clara County, MROSD, and FODHF has persisted. The partnership and shared funding model, while more complex, provides greater stability and will preserve Deer Hollow Farm as an active environmental education center. We owe a debt of gratitude to the pioneers, advocates, donors, board members, volunteers, staff and partners who have worked together to protect Deer Hollow Farm. We are committed and energized to continue the work of preserving history, supporting impactful environmental education, and strengthening community for generations to come.

Iron Ranger Gets a Refresh

ave you ever wondered what the red, white and blue sculpture is used for at Deer Hollow Farm? It is the Iron Ranger, a donation collector, created by Dr. Hardin "Hardy" Jones, to help raise funds for the farm. We check the Iron Ranger every month, and are always thankful for what is inside.

Farm Projects Enhance Educational Programs


S ince 1994, Deer Hollow Farm has undergone a multitude of enhancement projects focused on making the farm safer, enhancing the educational experience, and protecting investments. Each year FODHF, using available funding, reviews and approves staff recommended enhancements to the Farm. Over the past 30 years, FODHF has funded approximately \$500k in capital improvements and \$650k in operations and farm ehancement projects.

Improvements were made to the Historic White Barn. The Milking Room was enhanced by adding equipment to more fully address sanitary conditions, and creating a small area for goat milking demonstrations as well as providing storage space for animal medical and care supplies. Additionally, a generous donor provided funding for a new roof, new flooring, improved access to the loft, and repainting the exterior. The White Barn has been transformed from a building which only provided a view from the outside looking in, to now being a fully inclusive hands-on experience for all students; toddlers all the way up to the teenage summer campers.

Other improvements include adding an amphitheater and sweat lodge to the replica Ohlone Village, an outdoor cow milking demonstration platform, upgrades to fencing and gates, and improvements to the Blacksmith Shed. An enclosure was built that enables classes to enter a garden area directly from the dwarf orchard. The Nature Center has enhancements that benefit the Life Sciences classes as well as occasional visits from the general public. Minor things like adding restrooms and cleaning basins extends the students' learning time. A second goat barn was built to house male goats and for breeding purposes. Additional seating and interpretive signage have benefited both classes and public visitors.

The Farm is an historic educational and recreational gem that has been enjoyed by numerous classes and the public for decades. Only by the hard work and generous contributions of many individuals, the surrounding communities, and numerous agencies and partners does it continue to thrive and grow. Thank you to the City of Mountain View, Santa Clara County Parks, and MROSD for their continued support and partnership.


April 20, 2024, 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Rengstorff Community Center
